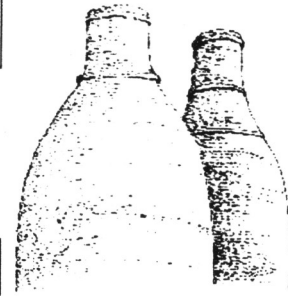

"Do not expect to find the Will of any married woman who predeceased her husband unless she was married after 1st January 1883 or unless a legal contract had been drawn up on her marriage to give her the power to dispose of certain possessions. Before the Married Woman's Property Act of 1882 every-thing that belonged to a woman, even the clothes she wore, became the property of her husband on marriage. Only Wills made by unmarried women, widows, and those with legal marriage contracts had any validity before 1883"

How Good is Your Memory?

Can you name, in succession, all the kings and queens who have ruled England since the Norman Conquest of 1066? I can. How? Here are the monarchs names according to the history books:

William I, William II, Henry I, Stephen (and Matilda), Henry II, Richard I, John, Henry III, Edward I, Edward II, Edward III, Richard II, Henry IV, Henry V, Henry VI, Edward IV, Edward V, Richard III, Henry VII, Henry VIII, Edward VI, Mary I, Elizabeth I, James I, Charles I, Charles II, James II, William III and Mary II, Anne, George I, George II, George III, George IV, William IV, Victoria, Edward VII, George V, Edward VIII, George VI, Elizabeth II.

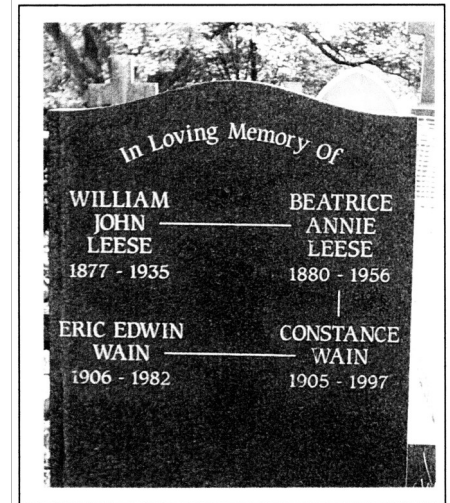

Whilst trying to find a family grave in the Cemeteries and Churchyards, have you come across any interesting headstones? For example, the following headstone was spotted by Roma Holiday at Longton Cemetery,



Seen in the cemetery of All Saints Church Dilhorne.

Here lies the remains of JOHN ROBEY of Blakelee Lane who died 3rd July 1808, aged 76 years. Also of CATHERINE the wife of SAMPSON WRIGHT of Captain Barn who died 28th January 1808 aged 48 years.

Husband farewell my life is past,

Also of MARY daughter of the above who died 12th March 1809 aged 20 years.
